Our mutual hope: that this initial Skilled Trades Summer program forms the foundation for expanding high-quality skilled trades education opportunities for public high school students across Los Angeles County.

Proposals for this summer program are due in January. Our hope is that The Learning Centers' proposal will receive a "green light" from Harbor Freight Tools for Schools, earning us the opportunity to launch a new program that expands the contributions Fairplex makes to our communities.
