
The year sprung to life with Fairplex's self-produced shows, beginning with its crown jewel, the LA County Fair, the return of traditional favorites like KABOOM! and welcoming a new Halloween event, LIGHTS OUT! The continued support of Fairplex Presents events reiterates one of the Strategic Plan's priorities to ensure that Fairplex is a model destination of art, culture and entertainment, where we celebrate the best of Southern California through innovative, diverse and engaging programming.











Spring Into Fair was the theme of the 101<sup>st</sup> anniversary LA County Fair – an aim to keep guests connected to the new season of the Fair. Guests tiptoed through the tulips and stopped and smelled the corn dogs on their way to fun, food and entertainment. We celebrated the Fair's second year with its new May schedule with a refreshing theme that welcomed everything spring – blossoms, buds and blooms; bees and butterflies; reinvention and innovation; pleasant weather; and the birth of four-legged babies in The Farm.

Fairguests enjoyed their top three favorites of the Fair – food, animals and the carnival. Ray Cammack Shows returned for its 37<sup>th</sup> year as carnival operator, with 60 rides and 30 games in two locations. Cal Poly Pomona returned as stewards of the animals in the Big Red Barn, and an oversized LEGO® exhibit in Expo Hall 9 awed guests of all ages.

For the first time in its 101-year history, the Fair partnered with the Los Angeles County Museum of Art to host a photography exhibition in the Millard Sheets Art Center, **You Are Here: California Photography Now**.

The hope is to continue a collaboration with LACMA to bring more exhibits to the Fair.

The Fair saw an attendance of 717,815, an increase from 2022. The trend upward was expected as more people return to entertainment activities post-pandemic.


## In-N-Out 75th Anniversary

Fairplex met with various departments of the County of Los Angeles to present the draft presentations and community feedback, gathered in 2022. Departments shared their input and were enthusiastic in the possibilities for the eastern-most region of Los Angeles County. Fairplex, the City of Pomona and Los Angeles County also worked together to establish processes of review in preparation for the Fairplex Specific Plan. This process will be instrumental in moving the Specific Plan forward and kicking off the technical review in 2024. Fairplex is excited to continue with the Specific Plan and planning for the next century of memories.

## **COMMUNITY PARTNER**



For more than 100 years, Fairplex has remained committed to our local community and regional partners. Fairplex is dedicated to building stronger communities through responsible and relevant programs that create a positive influence in our community. As an organization, we are an important component to the social and physical environment of our community. It is our responsibility to be an active and conscientious member.

# THE LEARNING CENTERS



Education has been a commitment of Fairplex since its inception in 1922. Programs have evolved and thrived, resulting in an impressive and enduring educational legacy for the surrounding communities.

The Learning Centers at Fairplex (TLC), a non-profit 501 (c)(3) organization, is uniquely positioned to provide a wide variety of educational programs at Fairplex. By complementing existing businesses and activities on the 500-acre Fairplex campus, TLC's unique programs offer participants several relevant opportunities, from early childhood education to adult learning, and fulfills unmet educational needs in the community.

TLC's career technical education program received a major boost with \$1.9 million in state funding thanks to Assemblymember Freddie Rodriguez (D-53). Assembly member Rodriguez secured the grant in the 2024 state budget to fund the Career and Technical Education Center (CTEC). The funding will help strengthen and expand facilities, learning tools and technology, allowing TLC to provide a high-quality career readiness program to a greater number of youth across the region.

# NURTURING AND EDUCATING THE FUTURE



The Child Development Center (CDC) at Fairplex, also a non-profit 501 (c)(3) organization, in partnership with the University of La Verne, is a valuable community resource serving families with children from 12 weeks to 6 years old. Its staff of highly trained experts has designed an environment of learning that encourages its young students to solve problems while developing empathy, and which provides parents with education on parenting – to engage the family as a whole. The CDC served 215 children in 2023.





## **CAREER EDUCATION**

The Career Technical Education Center (CTEC) provides hands-on workforce development and transformational programs that prepare local high school students for long-term career pathways. Through hands-on classroom instruction by credentialed instructors who are industry professionals, engagement with industry experts from the surrounding communities and interaction with real work sites and professional environments, CTEC provides innovative learning experiences that give students the necessary skills to enter the workforce or continue along the pathway of higher education.

## For 2023, CTEC served more than 200 students:

- Spring 2023 Enrollment 82 students
- Summer 2023 Enrollment 36 students
- Fall 2023 Enrollment 85

## THE FARM

The key to the success of The Learning Centers and Fairplex is community involvement. The Ambassador Volunteer Program consists of dedicated volunteers, called Ambassadors, willing to share their time, talents and commitment to serving others through various Fairplex activities. In 2023, more than 200 Ambassadors assisted in the areas of the LA County Fair, The Farm, Fairplex Garden Railroad

and more. Ambassadors gave approximately 17,000 hours of their time.

THE RETURN OF STUDENTS

More than 17,000 students and teachers visited the LA County Fair for free field trips in May as the FairKids Field Trip Program returned after being on hiatus. As volunteers from TLC's Ambassador Volunteer Program lined up to greet them, thousands of students from schools throughout Southern California entered the campus of the LA County Fair ready to be awed, ready to learn and ready to explore. Thanks to generous donations, students attend The World's Largest Classroom for a day to learn lessons that will last a lifetime.

The Farm at Fairplex continues to be an innovative, model agricultural business and educational resource that serves our diverse communities. Through sustainable and locally focused programs, The Farm builds awareness of healthy food possibilities, provides business incubator programs for the agriculture and food service industry, and educates in multiple areas of farm-related culinary and agriculture disciplines, with the goal being to prepare students for careers in agriculture. Year-round field trips brought more than 900 students to learn about agriculture.


